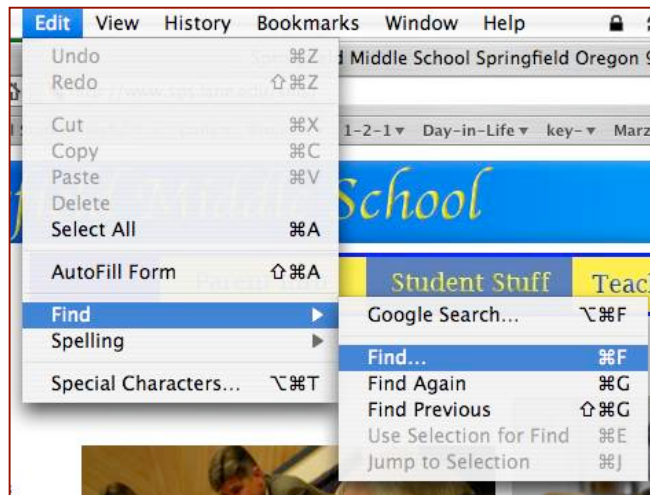


Safari as a literacy tool: Finding vocabulary words on a web page

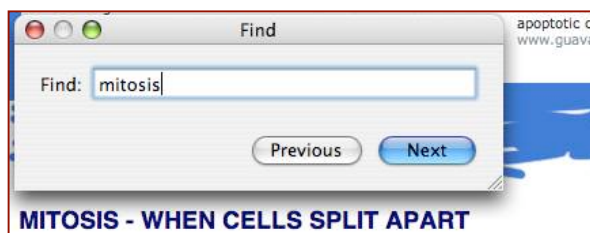
Scenario: You use a Boolean search to find out about cell mitosis. You find the site but you are unsure just WHERE on the site the information is located. To easily find KEYWORDS, use the FIND tool.

Safari FIND function

In Safari go to EDIT → FIND



The next window is the FIND window. Type in the word(s)



The word is highlighted on the page! The word is highlighted in a grey background. Sometimes it can be difficult to see, so look carefully. In the FIND window, clicking the NEXT button will move the highlighter to the next instance that your word turns up on the web page.

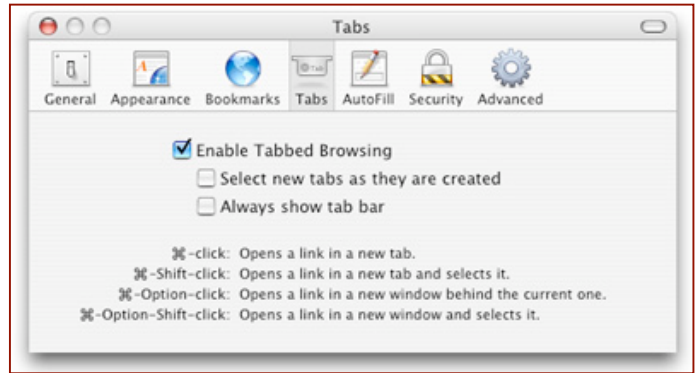


TABBED BROWSING:

Scenario: Students are searching for cell mitosis on a few web sites. They need to be able to jump back and forth between pages easily and quickly. The students need to be able to search for terms on all of the pages.

In a nutshell: Open Safari, the application, and choose Safari (from the menu bar) → Preferences → TABS → select “enable tabbed browsing”

- To open new tabs in front of the current tab, select the "Select new tabs as they are created" checkbox.
- Select the "Always show tab bar" checkbox to see a tab even if you have only one webpage open.



Now, when a student want to use a link to go to a new page, if they press the APPLE key and click the link, it will open the link in a new tab. In the image below you can see three biology tabs open at one time. By clicking on the tab the student immediately switches pages without having to click the forward or backwards arrow. It makes it easy to search for key words on different pages.



Click in the X on the left side of each tab closes that tab.

Second Language Option with Safari and a computer:

Changing the language that Safari is presented in:

Open System Preferences and click International. Drag your preferred language to the top of the Languages list.

If Safari is open, quit and open it again.
